For your work in World Performance you will be required to have access to the following texts. Students find it useful to be able to annotate texts, so we recommend that you purchase your own copies:

You should also be familiar with and have copies of the following epics, which form the basis for much of world drama:

- *The Iliad, The Odyssey* (Homer)
- *Ramayana* (Valmiki)
- *Mahabharata*

All of these are available in modern translations and it is perfectly acceptable to get an abridged copy of the Mahabharata as it is quite long. We suggest that you also have your own copy of Shakespeare's complete works.

We will be working through the following list of plays in seminar classes throughout the year and you should have all of the plays from the start.

All are published by Oxford Classics, Penguin or Nick Hern Books and available to order online (e.g. Amazon) or at good theatrical bookshops:
